EXECUTIVE ORDER }
No. 106. }

Pursuant to the provisions of Act Numbered Six hundred and forty-eight, Philippine Commission, entitled "An Act authorizing the Governor-General to reserve for civil public purposes, and from sale or settlement, any part of the public domain not appropriated by law for special public purposes, until otherwise directed by law, and extending the provisions of Act Numbered Six hundred and twenty-seven so that public lands desired to be reserved by the Insular Government for public uses, or private lands desired to be purchased by the Insular Government for such uses, may be brought under the operation of the Land Registration Act," I hereby reserve for Constabulary purposes and withdraw from sale or settlement the following described parcel of public domain in the settlement of Waloe, Province of Agusan, Island of Mindanao, to wit:

Beginning at point marked 1 on plan II-9109, S. $54^{\circ} 04'$ W. 187.88 m. from point 3 of this property which is identical with P. L. S./B. L. concrete monument 16 x 16 x 40 cm., thence N. $45^{\circ} 30'$ E. 169.68 m. to point 2; S. $74^{\circ} 27'$ E. 32.28 m. to point 3; S. $41^{\circ} 40'$ E. 84.92 m. to point 4; S. $17^{\circ} 43'$ E. 51.51 m. to point 5; S. $65^{\circ} 15'$ W. 180.03 m. to point 6; N. $44^{\circ} 03'$ W. 23.61 m. to point 7; N. $32^{\circ} 05'$ W. 39.58 m. to point 8; N. $40^{\circ} 41'$ W. 35.79 m. to point 1, point of beginning.

Containing 24,448 square meters.

Points 1, 2, 3, 4, and 8, P. L. S./B. L. concrete monuments; points 5 and 6, nails in cross blaze on trees and on bank of Umayan River; point 7, stone.

Bounded on northeast by public land and Waloe Settlement (school farm); on southeast by Umayan River; on southwest by public land and property of the provincial government of Agusan; on northwest by road.

Bearings true. Declination $1^{\circ} 53'$ E.

Points referred to marked on plan II-9109.
